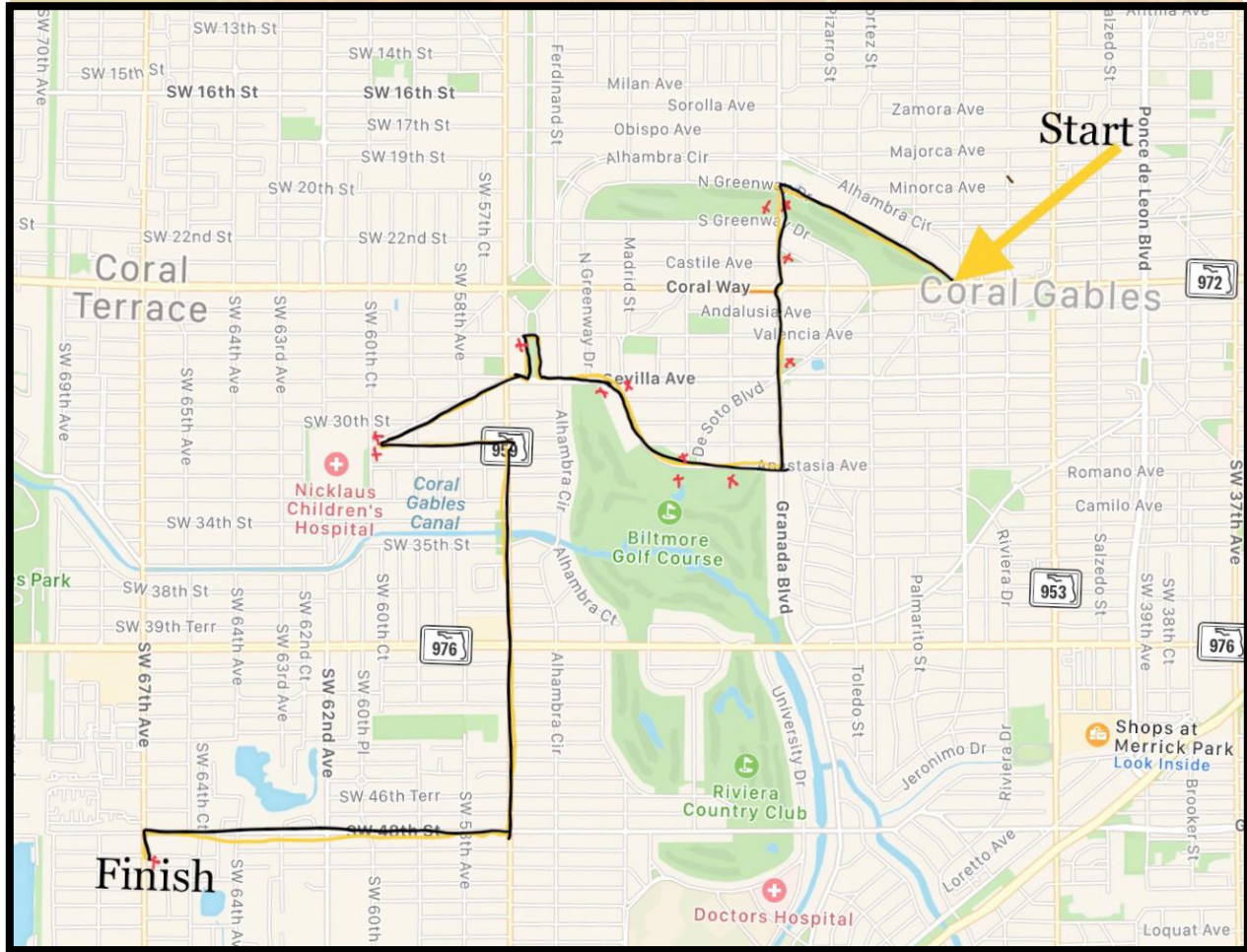


Royal Poinciana Fiesta



2021 Self Guided Tour

Start at the East end of Granada Golf Course in Coral Gables

Take N Greenway Drive to Granada Ave -Nice Royal Poincianas on the left on golf course.

Turn left on Granada - nice Royal Poinciana and Cassia sp. together on the right on golf course.

Continue to Young Park on Granada.

1 block south of Golf course there is a Royal Poinciana and Cassia fistula (Golden Shower tree) on the left in park.

Continue on Granada South - cross Coral Way and continue to De Soto Fountain.-
Nice Cassia fistula on corner of Sevilla near Venetian Pool.

Continue on Granada to Anastasia and turn right. Golden Royal Poinciana on the left on Biltmore Golf Course and another Royal Poinciana on the right and left as you pass the Biltmore Hotel.

Continue on Anastasia to Church of the Little Flower. Two nice Royal Poincianas in plaza in front of the church.

Turn left just past plaza onto Sevilla

Pass the stoplight to see Golden Royal Poincianas on the left.

Turn right onto Country Club Prado

Make your 1st left then left again back towards Sevilla. Here is a Large Royal Poinciana on the right that is a highlight on our guided bus tours.

Turn Right onto Sevilla and cross Red Road and continue on Devonshire towards Nicklaus Children's Hospital. Gorgeous trees at plaza there. A stopping point for our guided bus tour.

Head back to Red Road on 31st Avenue.

Turn right. Cross Bird Road and go to Blue Road.

Turn right and go to Ludlam (67th Ave)

Turn left. There's a beautiful big Royal Poinciana tree on left.

Turn right on street after the big tree and wander around this neighborhood then return to Ludlam.

Finish.
